

# **Invitation to Special Congregational Meeting**

### Sunday, November 12, between services (hybrid: both in person and online via Zoom)

IUCC will be conducting a Special Congregational Meeting for the congregation to vote to accept the transfer of title to the property located at 4915 Alton Parkway, Irvine, CA from the Southern California Nevada Conference of the UCC (Conference) and pay closing costs. In order for us to conduct this meeting, we need a quorum of 25% of corporate members, so your attendance is very important!

After the Special Congregational Meeting, join the Admin Board as they host Coffee Hour in Plumer Hall. They will be providing financial updates for the congregation, progress on our strategic plan, and other administration updates. Come meet IUCC leaders and ask questions!

### Informational Forum: Sunday, November 5, between services (also hybrid)

Per our Bylaws, when a congregational meeting is conducted electronically, there must be a <u>Informational</u> <u>Forum</u> at least 7 days beforehand to answer any questions. Edith Guffey (Project Manager for Administration for the Conference) will be available online to explain the transfer and answer any questions.

### **Reason for Special Meeting**

IUCC began as a new church start-up sponsored by the Church Development Commission of the Southern California Nevada Conference of the UCC in 1979. In all the years since then, the Conference has held the deed to our property. Even as we opened our preschool, built our new sanctuary, and added new offices and meeting rooms adjacent to the sanctuary, we've done so as a long-term lessee, not as an owner. All of the improvements we've made to the property through the years have increased its value to the Conference, not to IUCC itself.

Now, a major opportunity has presented itself, and we are thrilled beyond words! The Conference has decided it should no longer be in the business of owning church properties, and it is ready to remove itself from the title. The Conference has notified us that we – along with about a dozen other UCC churches – will be given the deeds to our facilities. This action will give us 100% authority over the property we have worked so hard to build and maintain, which we don't have right now. This is something we've long wanted to happen, and we couldn't be more pleased and excited!

All the Conference asks in return is that we pay the closing costs of the transfer (up to \$4000) and acknowledge that if our church dissolves, the property will revert back to the Conference (this is consistent with our covenantal values and already part of our bylaws right now). Our Treasurer has assured us that the Administration Board can absorb the closing costs as part of its discretionary fund should the congregation vote to accept the transfer of property.

Because our bylaws require that any kind of transfer of real property be authorized by a vote of 2/3 of the congregation (even when the transfer is of tremendous benefit to us), we are calling a Special Congregational Meeting for this purpose between services on November 12. As with all our congregational meetings, we must have a quorum present to take care of business matters. Thus, we urge you to attend the meeting and vote YES on this amazing gift to our congregation!


### Photos from AIDS Walk on Oct. 7






# Pre-Thanksgiving Joint Service with University Synagogue on Nov. 19

I am fond of the challenges that invite us to daily name those things for which we are grateful because a habit of gratitude can make us happier people less likely to covet others' lives

and things, and find contentment with ourselves and the gifts we have even as we seek to work towards a better world for all.

There are so many reasons to give thanks! Writing a newsletter article always puts me in a reflective mood, recalling the memories we created together in the past month. October ended with so much joy as we celebrated Halloween with our Spooky Sunday and Trunk-or-Treat! It was so much fun with incredible creativity! I love all the themes that people bring and how much thought goes into creating a trunk! My favorite car was at our preschool Trunk-or-Treat where a VW bus came as a whale! It was adorable! Dear friends and members of IUCC,

As you can see from the header, the theme for the 2024 stewardship pledge campaign is CHRISTS AMONG US. You may be wondering what that means exactly. As we reflect upon the accomplishments that our church family has achieved this year, there are many notable examples of those who have acted as CHRISTS AMONG US in making a difference in our church community and/or the community at large.

We have many CHRISTS AMONG US participating in our missions and ministries to thank and be thankful for all they have done this past year:

- Those that gave up so much of their time and talent in the ECC Refresh and those that donated to defray the cost of the Refresh
- Those in leadership positions on our Administrative Board and our Ministries Board
- Those that donated their time facilitating celebrations under our sails, church picnics, bingo nights, Bon Vivant dinners, Comma groups, children and adult Sunday school, Bible study, PRIDE, and the AIDS Walk and Second Harvest Walk
- Those that served us as deacons, Stephen ministers, and in our office
- Those that brought God's love to us through song, music, and word
- Those that gave so much to IUCC through their time, talent, and treasure.

We have referenced, time, talent, and treasure, which are all key to the success of IUCC. They are like a three legged stool. If one leg is broken, the stool can collapse! Obviously, stewardship deals with our treasure. Your pledges are what build our treasury, supporting the many programs and missions that we have at IUCC.

As you hopefully know by now, my co-chair Bill Lawrence kicked off the start of our month-long stewardship campaign on October 22nd. As Bill mentioned in church, our leaders have determined a 2024 budget for IUCC for which we've set a goal of raising \$400,000 in pledges. I

am pleased to say that our church leadership had 100% participation in already, pledging \$126,000.

We've had a fair number of new people joining our church this past year. For those not aware of the concept of pledging, this is asking you to determine a dollar amount that you can realistically give to IUCC over the course of 2024 and then satisfying that pledge with installments that can be made in several different ways. Some pay in a single lump sum at the very beginning of the year. Others do monthly or weekly installments by credit card or cash. However, be certain that if you do it by cash in the collection plate, please put it in an envelope with your name to be certain you are credited with that amount towards satisfying your pledge.

The stewardship pledges serve a very important function. They allow our treasurer to see how realistically close projected revenue will matchthe projected budget for the next year. Given that pledges historically represent nearly 70% of our annual budget, pledges are critically important. We ask that you thoughtfully and prayerfully determine a pledge that is meaningful to you, hopefully increasing your pledge over those of the past to compensate for the ever increasing cost of services and salaries that the church faces so that we hopefully don't experience a deficit at the end of the year.

This is very much the same as you would determine a budget for yourself at home after evaluating your resources. No pledge is too small and certainly none is ever too large. A pledge that you can realistically give is certainly better than no pledge at all. If somehow circumstances change and you cannot satisfy your pledge by the end of 2024, we do ask that you notify our office. Fortunately, too, there are instances of members graciously supplementing their pledge with additional donations throughout the year.

So, please join Bill and myself and the rest of the IUCC leadership in making your pledge as soon as possible either online using this link: <a href="https://iucc.breezechms.com/form/f2783e">https://iucc.breezechms.com/form/f2783e</a> or by filling out a hardcopy pledge form which will be available at church during services, in the narthex, or at our information table.

At the time of this writing, we have raised \$190,905 towards our goal of \$400,000. Now that we are a little over halfway through our month of the stewardship pledge campaign, we're starting to fall behind a little, so please make your pledge just as soon as possible.

### **Financial Update**

It's Stewardship **and** Budget Planning season once again!! Since our last update presented at the Spring Congregational Meeting, IUCC's financial condition is close to break even when balanced with the General Fund deficit and Preschool's surplus.

Below are the Early Childcare Center and the IUCC General Fund financial summaries, followed by the IUCC Combined Summary.

Year-to-date revenue exceeded budget by 6%, totaling \$ 584,246. September revenue reflects an annual tuition increase of 7%. Expenses reflect the annual personnel COLA now on a September-August school year calendar. Personnel COLAs were in the 6% range, consistent with current market rates at competitive schools.

Year-to-date adjusted net income is \$ 77,201, exceeding the budget by 34%. The increase is partly thanks to the many ECC Refresh donations received earlier this year from the congregation that are now recognized as revenue to offset the refresh expenses.

Student enrollments were at 80% capacity at the end of September and are projected to increase over the next three months. The new ECC website and recent marketing initiatives should help increase enrolment to capacity.

The ECC Profit Contribution to the General Fund has increased over budget in recent months as profit returns have been positive. Year to date, ECC has contributed \$ 29,000 in cash profits to the IUCC General Fund and \$ 28,995 in IUCC office staff reimbursement for a total of \$ 57,995.

Year-to-date revenue is \$ 405,124, \$ 23,327 below budget. YTD pledge revenue is 1% below budget. Non-pledge contributions are 6% below budget YTD.

As of October 31, 2023, 85% of pledge commitments have been received, totaling \$ 329,157.

**Other income** includes facility rentals, which have grown significantly this year to \$ 32,156. Combined with the Woodbridge Parking rental, rentals total \$ 40,139 YTD. The ECC Profit Contribution was increased over budget, totaling \$29,000 YTD, 21% above budget.

### General Fund Adjusted Cash Net loss is (\$ 52,078).

Combined cash plus investments for **General Fund and ECC entities** was \$ **520,076**. Based on the average monthly expense run rate from both operating entities, cash reserves cover **4.34 months** of operating expenses.








### Elli Luke

# Personal Pronouns: They, Them A Non-Binary, Beautiful Transition of Personhood

Let us celebrate the ever-new ways of defining gender, of being, of living, of self-expression. Let us celebrate a beautiful transition of personhood.

Elli Luke has a beautiful personality, a quick mind and a gentle spirit. They are currently going through a process of gender identity change. Gender identity, rather than being static, is dynamic: an ever-flowing stream of humanity.

Looking through a transgender lens, we see a beautiful transition into a new form of personhood. Elli sees themself as non-binary but is currently in a trans space. According to Elli, the transition of personhood to become non-binary is both beautiful and difficult. It is hard work. It is expensive, including the cost of medical bills. It takes courage and perseverance. There is harsh societal blowback. In spite of all the difficulty, Elli fully embraces their personhood with joy, passion and pride.

#### Background

Elli was an actor in the Wayward Artist (Craig Tyrl's theater company) production of The Queer Couch. They participated in a Pie Day queer panel, a program of our Steven Ministry. Intersectionality is a big factor in their life because of being black and intersecting and interacting with having a non-binary gender identity. They were born and grew up in Westminster. The relationship between them and their parents was somewhat troubled. When Elli came out at age 17, there was quite a bit of resistance from their parents, who tried to tell them what to wear and what to do, and sometimes yelled at them. Because of the toxic home environment, Elli moved out and has been on their own since age 17. Elli was fortunate to have friends who were supportive.

Elli has five siblings, brothers age 22 and 33, and three younger sisters, ages 12, 14, and 15. Because their parents worked a lot, Elli had to take over the responsibility for the whole family, including their older brother. They are biracial, with a Caucasian mother and a Black father. They identify as Black.

Elli identifies with being non-binary, but is currently living more of a trans life. They are in a process of changing voice to a higher pitch, taking voice lessons and wearing different clothes.

They have received quite a bit of flak from people in general, having been called names and received cat calls. They are also acutely aware of an element of danger because of the violence against trans people. Elli is also concerned about laws passed and laws pending in the United States that would prohibit a person from being trans. Elli's desire is to be appreciated, respected, and validated for who they are, a person like anybody else.

Unfortunately, this inclusive attitude towards the queer community has been sadly lacking, with the opposite being the reality. A pervasive fear has caused deep seated prejudice and many instances of violence, as well as a plethora of litigation in the last few years, denying LGBTQ+ rights.

#### A non-binary gender-identity and authenticity

Self-identity (including gender identity) comes primarily from our interaction with other people when we are children growing up. However, there is within all of us, to varying degrees, an independent and autonomous spark that allows us to stand our own ground, to decide for ourselves freely and independently.

This autonomous (and authentic) inner self can be out of sync with a personality that has been formed from interaction with people in our cultural environment. A person can look in the mirror and see somebody else, rather than who they are. Elli speaks of the phenomena called body dysphoria, which is a big thing for trans people. Parts of their body are not them and they feel uncomfortable having body parts that do not fit their personhood. Surgery is sometimes used as a corrective to body dysphoria.

### What it means to have a non-binary gender-identity

Traditionally, gender was defined as binary: male and female. Non-binary means that there are more than two definitions of gender. A non-binary person does not identify as a man or a woman. Elli explains that non-binary means not only avoiding being male or female physically,

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but also avoiding all of the roles that women and men are pressured to play. Further, it allows a person to avoid all of the decisions that a man or woman must make. A person enjoys more freedom of choice, less restriction and not having to fill gender roles.

#### The queer community

Elli is a strong advocate for the queer community, for which they have a passionate love, along with a deep appreciation and respect. They talk about the cohesion and sense of belonging, and that even though a person may not be totally understood, they will be entirely respected and accepted by others. One member will battle for the rights of another member in a sacred solidarity and loyalty. They see true beauty, the beauty of human nature at its best.

How non queer (cisgender) people can be helpful allies Elli speaks of the critical need for listening. (I would add that listening needs to be with our heart, mind, and soul, our whole being.) Respect is essential. Don't make assumptions, just listen and learn. Be non-judgmental.

Elli makes a profound statement, that we must be open to changing our outdated thinking. To fully accept and respect people in the queer community, we must be willing to change some of the gender ideas that we learned as children and adults. This requires a radical openness to accepting new ways of being, of dressing, and new ways of expressing oneself. The job of an ally is to listen, learn, change thinking, validate and advocate for the general welfare of the queer community.

### Plans for the future

Elli is currently attending Fullerton Community College, seeking a degree in theater. They plan on pursuing an acting career, ultimately appearing in films. They want to live in New York in the future. Strong and smart, they are a passionate advocate for the queer community. They will spread sunshine wherever they go.
